



#### **Class News**

#### **Ercall**

Welcome to our nursery news.

Our topic book is 'Naughty Bus' and we invited the children to wear their pyjamas and bring their toothbrushes to nursery on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> to further develop an interest in the book whilst supporting oral health.

This week we have been collaging buses in our topic books which links to our theme 'Naughty Bus'.

During maths we have been exploring 2D shapes to create buses.

In provision we have been role-play pancake making, exploring measurements and baking books.

We have been thinking about St Valentine's Day this week, using tweezers to place pom-poms and buttons on heart templates. This activity was to support the development of fine motor skills throughout the week.

We have been playing a hula-hoop game every day this week in nursery to help raise awareness of Children's Mental Health Week. This was a really good activity which seemed to get all children engaged and connected. Well Done Ercall!

#### Lawley

This week we have been working on subtraction in maths. Reception has been looking at subtracting within 10, whilst Year One has been subtracting within 20. The children used ten frames and number lines to show their calculations. Mrs. Dykes and I have been so impressed with the children's enthusiasm for math's. We have also been practicing our number bonds songs to 10 and 20.

In R.E we have been continuing looking at Judaism and the importance of the ten commandments for Jewish people. We looked at how Jewish people believe these are Gods rules for them to live by and how Jewish people see this as God looking after them. We had a think about our own commandments that we could live with to keep us happy and safe. As a class when then went outside and used chalks to write our own commandments just like the original commandments were written on a stone.

The children loved doing this and really worked as a team to write/draw them. The children also enjoyed Faith in the Forest where they make Torah Hebrew scrolls using mud. All children had a go at writing their names in Hebrew.

In English we have been continuing to practice writing sentences independently in Year Reception and in Year One we have been looked at suffixes where we change the root words using 'est, er, ed and ing'. We have also been looking at exclamation marks in Year One.

A brilliant, jam-packed week Reception and Year One. Well done.

This week we explored the story of David and Goliath and discussed how all Bible stories have a moral or a lesson. We worked in groups to discuss the moral of this story and all agreed that it asks us to 'trust in God', 'God will protect you', 'Size doesn't matter', 'Stand up for yourself and others', 'love and faith will always win'. We then thought about a 'Goliath' in our lives and who we may have reached out to for support.

In Science this week we found out about John Boyd Dunlop, inventor of the pneumatic tyre. We were amazed at how a small idea had grown into such a big, world-wide company. Some of us realised that our own cars had Dunlop tyres. We discussed how materials, and the way we use them, are often developed because somebody comes across a problem. Perhaps we have future inventors at our school!

As part of Mental Health Week, we have been thinking about what it means to be kind to ourselves. We spent some time out of formal learning yesterday to do something kind for ourselves, that included quiet reading, painting, playing games with friends, time on the laptops or writing a small note to ourselves.

Discover the exciting world of STEM at the Royal Air Force Museum Midlands this February half term. Families are invited to take part in a week full of STEM activities, workshops and science shows, nestled amongst the inspiring aircraft displays.

Challenge your science skills, put your tech talents to the test, enhance your engineering abilities and add some magic to your mathematics. From 18-26 February, STEM Week offers families an exciting range of activities, helping children learn fundamental STEM concepts through play-based learning.

Get ready for lift off as you **launch a rocket** across the hangar and see how high and far will it go! Put your driving skills to the test by programming a **Sphero robot** and guide it through a maze. Or help save a biscuit from doom in the **cargo drop** activity, where you'll need to create a parachute to safely drop the biscuit from a height. These free drop-in activities will be rotated throughout the half term break, visit <u>rafmuseum.org/midlands</u> to see what's on each day.

Take your knowledge to the next level in the brilliantly mind-boggling **Science Show**. This interactive time traveling extravaganza takes the audience through the volatile history of Chemistry. Expect plenty of audience participation and spectacular chemistry demonstrations in a journey through important concepts from the world of chemistry. Suitable for children aged 7 and over, this exciting and explosive interactive science show will change the way you see Chemistry forever. The show will take place on three days throughout half term and will be delivered by the STEM Response Team from the Faculty of Science and Engineering (FSE) at the University of Wolverhampton. Tickets to the show are available to book online and cost £5.00, or £17.50 for a family (2 adults, 3 children).

The team from Raytheon will be encouraging families to take part in the **Mini Quadcopter Challenge**. Working in small teams you must work together to conceptualise and modify your Quadcopter based on a particular environmental challenge, this could be tracking polar bears in the arctic, or monitoring ocean plastic. You'll have to plan your route and navigate obstacles as you fly your quadcopter in a mission.

The GE Aerospace team will be onsite Monday to Friday with their **flight simulator and wind tunnel**, perfect for visitors who feel the need for speed! Participate in their interactive problem-solving activities, including; In The Flight Direction where you must solve the software bugs and restore the power connection in order to fly the plane in the right direction. The Cockpit Captain activity is perfect for future pilots, in this coding challenge you'll have to complete several tasks, including correctly coding the auto pilot to help the aircraft take off.

If your teenager is obsessed with capturing the perfect picture for social media, the **smartphone photography workshop** running on both Saturdays in February half term will help maximise their photography skills. In this hour long workshop, you will learn some basic photography theory, tips and tricks from the expert, before heading out into the hangars to practise your new skills. Delivered by Chappers Photography, this workshop is suitable for those aged 12 and over. Tickets cost £10.00 and are available to book online.










