

Class News

Ercall

This week in nursery we have been celebrating Chinese New Year- The year of the rabbit.

The children engaged well during story time, learning all about Chinese New Year celebrations.

We also enjoyed tasting Chinese foods which included: noodles, rice, prawn crackers and spring rolls.



We have developed our fine motor skills through exploring a tuff tray full of shredded paper, pom poms and Chinese symbols. The children used pincer grip tweezers to collect the red pom poms from the tray.















We enjoyed exploring the remaining snow, through building snowmen and looking at our footprints in the snow.

Outdoors we have built tall London towers which links to our topic, 'Naughty Bus'- We discussed the sizes of our towers to see whose was the tallest and who built the shortest.

During phonics, we have been concentrating on the sound, 'o'....next week week we will be finding objects which begin with the phoneme, 'c'.

Well done Ercall, another fantastic week of learning.

<u>Lawley</u>

This week the children in Year One have started looking at suffixes adding 'er', 'est', 'ed' and 'ing' to root words to change the meaning of the words, such as tall could become 'taller' or 'tallest'. It was a very tricky concept and I have been delighted that the children have worked hard to add suffixes in their English word to describe the Lion inside. Well done Year One.

Reception have also worked hard in English to develop their sentence writing. We have been looking at adding adjectives into our writing to make it more interesting for the reader. Reception have also been developing the use of capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. Everyone has made a great effort so well done Reception.

In maths we have been working on number bonds to 10 for Reception and our recall of number bonds to 10 whilst Year One have been looking at number bonds to 20. The children have done lots of practical maths involving splitting up two parts to make their whole















number. The children have enjoyed dancing and singing to Jack Hartmann's number bonds songs.

In Geography we have been looking at this week's weather and the weather in the UK. Next week we will be going out with rain gauges to measure the amount of rainfall we have had in a day.
