Welcome back to nursery everyone!

We have had a wonderful first week back.

Our new literacy topic book is, 'The Journey Home' and our provision is set up with farms and animals to develop learning of the story further.

This week during phonics sessions we have been exploring words which begin with the initial sound, 'r'. The children also enjoyed lots of rhyming games and stories.

We enjoyed a spring walk on St Davids Day. We heard the birds singing, we also found daffodils and snowdrops along the way.

In maths this week we have been exploring colour and pattern with the peg boards which also helps to develop our fine motor skills.

During Literacy we designed our own hats and scarves, thinking about the patterns we could choose throughout.

In our topic books we have used small world animals in the paint to create footprints. We discussed colour, shape and size of all the footprints.

Our nursery children went for an adventure on Wednesday to explore all of the school classrooms- this was very exciting for us all, we enjoyed looking at the beautiful display work- Well done to our school children.

<u>Lawley</u>

Welcome Back Lawley... we hope you have had a lovely half term.

This week has already been jam packed. In English we have started our new topic book 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth' the children have enjoyed reading the opening of the story and making their predications on the book.

On Monday we were excited that Mrs Dykes came running in to tell us she had found some dinosaur bones and fossils in the school Forest Area. We quickly went to explore them. We were all super excited and curious about where they had come from and why they were in our school grounds. We dug the bones and fossils up and took them back to class to add to our new role play 'Museum'. The children then went on to write about what we had found.

Reception have been working on writing sentences independently with a capital letter, finger spaces and full stops, whilst Year One did the same but they were encouraged to use adjectives, connectives and suffixes within their writing.

In maths we are continuing Primary Stars Maths. In Year One we are looking at place value within 50 whilst Reception are consolidating numbers to 20 and looking at place value within 20. Reception have been looking at cardinal values and matching the amounts to the numbers and Year One have been using the dienes equipment to represent numbers within 50 splitting them into tens and ones.

In Phonics we are recapping Phase 3 sounds in Reception and working through Phase 5 'Grow the Code' for Year One.

In class we now have a new 'Challenge Area Zone' for the children to deepen their knowledge each week. The children have two weekly challenges to complete as well as having access to enhanced learning within provision. One of the weekly challenges is topic related either history, art, science, R.E or a fine motor skill based. The second challenge will be either english, maths or phonics based. These challenges allow the children to be independent learners and take ownership of their learning. When the children have completed their challenges they have a crib sheet to tick off so I can see who has completed these.

A great first week back Lawley. Well done.

This is the term where our classroom really comes to life! Our science unit is 'Animals and their needs' and this week we followed a live webcam feed of 8 blue tit nesting boxes. the day so that we can follow their progress over the coming weeks. Perhaps we could set up a webcam in our own bird boxes in the future!

We are also excitedly awaiting delivery of our caterpillars so that we can watch the transformation to butterflies. We will work closely with eco-council to plant seeds of flowers the butterflies will love, and also some mature plants ready for their release.
















WHAT IS THE PTA?





Advice for parents on visits to settings involving contact with animals

Visitor attractions involving contact with animals are understandably popular with parents and children but do carry a risk from infectious diseases.

All animals naturally carry a range of micro-organisms, some of which can be transmitted to humans, where they may cause ill health. Some of these, such as E. coli O157 or Cryptosporidium (Crypto), present a serious health hazard and have the potential to cause serious illness which may be particularly severe in young children. We see many cases of Crypto each year in the Health Protection Hub, particularly among children, and it's a miserable experience for them and their parents.

Following these practical steps will help your child stay safe and healthy:

- ➤ Children should wash their hands in the following four situations: after contacting animals, before eating, before and after using play equipment, and when leaving site. It will help to explain why they must wash their hands thoroughly in these situations and to show them what proper handwashing looks like. Bear in mind that alcohol gel is not a suitable substitute for proper hand washing with soap and running water it doesn't work against Cryptosporidium.
- > Do not suck fingers or put hands, pens, pencils or crayons etc. in mouths.
- Check that cuts, grazes etc. on children's hands are covered with a waterproof dressing.
- Do not kiss animals.
- Eat only food that you have brought with you or food for human consumption that you have bought on the premises, and eat only in designated areas.
- Never eat food that has fallen to the ground.
- Never taste animal foods.
- Children should not eat, drink or chew anything (including sweets) outside the areas designated for eating at the visitor attraction.
- Where possible, clean or clean and change footwear before leaving. The site should have facilities to clean footwear and pushchair/pram wheels as you leave the site. Wash hands after cleaning/changing footwear.
- > Do not use or pick up tools (e.g. spades and forks) or touch other work equipment unless permitted to do so by site staff.
- ➤ Do not climb on to walls, fences, gates or animal pens etc. Some animals put their feet on the fences of their pens and contaminate them with faecal matter.
- > Listen carefully and follow the instructions and information given by the site staff.
- Do not wander off into unsupervised or prohibited areas e.g. manure heaps.
- Allow plenty of time for hand washing before eating or leaving the site so that the children do not have to rush.
- ➤ If a member of your group shows signs of illness (e.g. sickness or diarrhoea) after a visit, visit the doctor and explain that they have had recent contact with animals. Please also contact the attraction you visited and inform them of the illness
