We are enjoying the sunshine in nursery this week.

Together we have enjoyed number fun in the garden and a number hunt in the forest. We have also been learning positional language such as on, in, under, beneath and next to.

Our children have used their voices to create many different sounds during our phonics sessions. We have been learning the initial sound, 'qu' such as queen, quack and quick.

Following our topic, 'The whale who wanted more', we have been collecting and counting treasure from the treasure chest. We have also been sorting shells and pebbles according to their properties. In our topic books we have been making 'help' posters and cards for Humphrey the whale to help cheer him up.

In provision we have been exploring the 'five little speckled frogs' tuff tray, recognising numerals and matching number to the quantity of frogs.











