



Welcome to our nursery news!

This week we have been exploring colour mixing using primary-coloured paints.

In phonics we have been oral blending through many different activities such as: 'What sound does a d-u-ck make?' The children respond with a 'quack' to show their understanding. The sentence is always repeated to ensure all children have understood, 'What sound does a duck make?'

We have all planted a sunflower seed to take home. Feel free to bring a photo of the sunflower for the children to share during show and tell.

In provision we have been exploring sea creatures in the water, planting seeds, creating puppets based upon our feelings and using fine motor skills to cut tulips with scissors.

Over the half term we have been busy exploring our science topics of plants. Our sunflowers are starting to grow and we are asking children to continue to look after their plants at home and to take pictures or draw the progress of their plant. We are interested to see who can grow the tallest sunflower.

We have had a great time in our forest school sessions, identifying trees and sketching wild plants and flowers. We learnt the difference between wild and cultivated plants and have been painting cultivated plants in provision throughout the week.

Chaplin Hannah, who joins us in the forest every week for Fun and Faith, has been teaching us all about The Kingdom of God and Jesus' healing through children's bible stories linking to nature and trees. We also made nature crowns to help us remember the coming of the Holy Spirit who is always there to support and guide us especially if we feel nervous or scared. The children have enjoyed listening to and acting out these stories as well as sharing our Forest Prayer. We also raised a glass of juice in the forest to celebrate Chaplin Hannah's upcoming wedding!
