In our funky fingers area we have been decorating crowns with buttons and jewels to help develop our fine motor skills.

Our new Pathways to write story is, 'The Sea-Saw', which the children have shown excitement and great interest in so far.

In Forest school this week we created repeating patterns using daisies, pine cones, sticks, leaves and bottle tops.

#### <u>Class 1</u>

It has been a great first week back after half term. We started the week off with our school Jubilee and 150th birthday party. The children took part in a carousel of Queen themed activities and also produced some lovely writing for our school time capsule. In the afternoon we were lucky enough to have a whole school party with parent and carer visitors. The children enjoyed dancing, eating scones and seeing their families.



Our topic this term is 'At The Seaside'. The children have enjoyed exploring our beach themed tuff trays and provision. The children have also liked reading lots of topic books such as 'Tiddler' and 'The Tail of the Whale'.

We have started our Pathways to Poetry this week focusing on a book called 'Eat Your Peas Louise!' the children have enjoyed hunting for vegetables around the school grounds and then writing adjectives in groups to describe them. Over the next week children will be writing their own poem as a class linked to 'Eat Your Peas Louise!'.

In maths we have been revisiting the concept of doubling. The children have worked hard to find doubles and practised finding lady bird doubles. Children have been challenged to write number addition sentences linked to their doubles.

## <u>Class 2</u>

What a busy week! In Science this term we will be learning about the weather and different weather patterns in the UK. We have made various weather station equipment this week, including rain gauges and windsocks. We will take recordings every week and populate these on a graph to look for patterns and trends. We will also be visiting the Millenium pond to carry out some more work from our Habitats unit, find out how we got on in next week's newsletter.

















In English we are writing poems, based on the fruit poem Plum! By Tony Mitton. We have been working in pairs to explore a wide range of fruit, using our five senses. As we begin to construct our poems, we have looked closely at rhyming words.

Our D&T challenge this term is to design and make a boat to carry our explorer across the sea. This week we researched different styles of boat, what materials they are made of and the shape and size. We also looked at how they are powered to move through the water.

# Help with music lesson costs available

# Is your child aged 7-11 and

# costs are too much to manage?

 If you are in receipt of benefits (including Child Tax Credits) and are on a low income, or have exceptional circumstances,

the Jon Hayward Memorial Trust may be able to help.

- The Trust has been providing financial assistance to eligible children in the Shropshire Council area since 2008.
- ✤ We award **bursaries** on an annual basis to part-fund (up to 50%) the cost of **music lessons** for a number of children, who have an interest in and aptitude for music, but are prevented from pursuing this due to their family's financial situation and the lack of funding from elsewhere.
- Our support can be for lessons in school, or arranged privately.
- We also have a number of instruments (violins and guitars) which we are able to loan to interested families free-of-charge (provided the instruments are returned in good condition.)

Referral forms and all details have been sent to your school, but if you have any queries, please e-mail jonhaywardmemorialtrust@hotmail.co.uk.

Forms received by **15<sup>th</sup> July** will have priority but we will consider applications at other times of the year if we are able to; we have a total of 20 bursaries available for the next academic year.

Jon Hayward was a well-known Shropshire folk musician and singer who died of cancer in 2006, aged 53.

He loved sharing his enthusiasm for music, especially with children.

Family and friends, with the support of numerous musicians, have been fundraising since 2007 in order to enable children, who might not otherwise get the opportunity, to access music.
