We are enjoying our week in nursery, our new starter children seem to be settling in well and we are having lot's of fun!

In maths this week we have been creating patterns using natural objects and exploring the terms 'how much and how many' within our learning.















During our literacy sessions we have been busy designing our own gingerbread men in our topic books.

We have explored gingerbread puppet making within our provision too this week.

We also enjoyed a fun phonics game of making 'silly soup' using objects beginning with the phoneme 'a'.

In provision we had a baking tray for the children to use real flour and practice their baking skills.

We are very excited that our nursery children will soon be given the opportunity to bring a school



book home once a week to read with you. We ask you please to help your child take good care of our special books and return them weekly for us to change. We know the children are really looking forward to taking books home and we hope this will further encourage our love of books and storytime.

<u>Lawley</u>

We had a fantastic first full week at school in our mixed Reception/Year One class. All Reception children have settled in really well and I am proud of both year groups coming into school 'ready to learn', which is our new school motto.

In maths this week we have been working through our new 'Primary Star' maths. We have been looking at numbers to 10 in Reception, counting them and representing them as well as counting objects based on colour and size. In Year One we have been recapping numbers to 10 as looking further at numbers to 30. The children have been counting objects based on multiple characteristics such as colour, size, shape and type.

In Literacy we have been looking at 'Sea Songs' for our pathways to poetry. Reception has been focusing on rhyming words whereas year one has been looking at writing rhyming strings and lists.

Reception started our Little Wandle phonics focusing on 's,a,t,p' the last week. They have been practicing forming these letters in creative ways such as with the glitter and whiteboards. Year One is focusing on phase 4 where they are really consolidating their phase 3 knowledge.

Can we please ask that where possible children practice there sounds at home. This can be through chatting about their sounds or from their Little Wandle extended learning sheets. The more children practice these sounds and practice reading the quicker we will be developing blending in Reception and fluency in Year One.









What a busy, first full week back in school! Wrekin class have been busy learning to tie their laces this week, using videos and step by step guides. We have also discussed the importance of tying our laces correctly.

In Maths we are exploring place value, and everyone is now able to partition numbers into tens and ones; recognising the value of the digit representing the tens and the digit representing the ones. This understanding will help support us as we move onto addition and subtraction.

For Science this week we headed outdoors and explored a variety of micro-habitats. We grouped the things we found into living, non-living and never lived and discussed the meaning of these words.

Child Exploitation in Shropshire

How to recognise if your child may be being exploited, and what you can do to help reduce the risks

















What is Exploitation?

Are you concerned about changes in your child's behaviour? Have you noticed that they may be feeling under pressure from influences from outside your family home? Realising that your child could be being exploited can be distressing, but help and support is available.

Exploitation is a form of abuse, it occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child, young person or adult into any activity that results in an advantage for the perpetrator. Specific types of Exploitation include **Sexual Exploitation, Criminal Exploitation**, and **Financial Exploitation**.

Who does it affect?

Exploitation can happen to any young person from any background, in any part of the country - including Shropshire. The young person often isn't aware that they are a victim, as exploiters are very clever in the way they manipulate the young person into trusting them.

Between April 2020 - April 2021, Shropshire Children's Services received **361 referrals for young people believed to have been either exploited, targeted or vulnerable**. These numbers continue to rise.

What are the signs?

- New friendship groups, who may be older in age
- Engaging in sexual activity, including exchanging indecent photos
- Missing episodes, when you don't know their whereabouts
- Receiving gifts & rewards, including drugs, alcohol, food & clothing
- Increased secretiveness, particularly around phone use
- Disengagement from school, hobbies & family
- Use of drugs or alcohol, perhaps without the means to afford this
- A decline in mental health, possibly becoming more aggressive
- Possession of a weapon, and/or committing low level crimes
































Report concerns about a child

Shropshire's TREES (Together Reducing & Ending Exploitation in Shropshire) Team are based within Children's Services. We are committed to identifying young people who are at risk of exploitation, and supporting professionals and families to reduce these risks. It is recognised that these risks are out in the community, rather than within the family home. This is what is known as **Contextual Safeguarding**.

We can offer social care support to families where appropriate, or we can signpost to another support service such as a substance misuse service, sexual abuse support service, Early Help or diversionary activities - with the aim of disrupting exploitation and reducing the risks going forward.


